

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

GETAWAY REFLECTIONS ON AUTUMN

Eat Local

Talented chefs tempt your taste buds with surprising flavors.

Begin a day of deliciousness in Aurora with a simple yet delectable dish: bread and butter at Society 57. Katich Breads supplies the sourdough, which is smothered with European butter and a sprinkling of Hawaiian black salt. At Hardware Gastropub in North Aurora, Executive ChefAlyseMarie Warren uses produce and herbs grown on-site for the Green House salad and other seasonal dishes. Plan to $complement your \, hyperfresh$ lunch with a memorable sip. They grow the hops used in their craft beers, plus Hardware is known for its 600 whiskeys.

One of the best streets for food in the Fox River Valley (and a short walk from the train station) is Third Street in Geneva, Graham's **Fine Chocolates and Ice Cream** evokes the charm of a vintage candy store and satisfies your sweet tooth. While delectable, don't let Graham's chocolates, caramel s'mores and handmade ice cream fill you up. Instead, head to Preservation, open for lunch and dinner. The restaurant focuses on creative cuisine that's meant to be shared with your tablemates. Opt for a seat on the covered patio, also the spot for live music. Niche Restaurant stimulates the senses with seasonal dishes like slowroasted short rib.

Once a month, **Heritage Prairie Farm** in Elburn offers themed outdoor dinners for the over-21 crowd, including the celebrated Roots and Wine Farm Dinner (October 10).

For hip eats in an artsy environment, **Craft Urban** in Aurora and Geneva offers daily specials like half-price burgers on Industry Night (Monday) and late-night ramen on weekends. For happy hour deals on food, wine and craft beer, head to **The Lone Buffalo** in Ottawa, where a chef-crafted menu is inspired by local farmers.

Out and About

Fox River Valley provides big-city conveniences with small-town heart and rural touches.

ALONG THE TRAIL Walkers and cyclists love the 45-mile Fox River Trail for its mix offlat and rolling hill sectionsas well as gorgeous views of its namesake river accented by a rainbow of autumn hues. The trailloops through the Fabyan Forest Preserve. Hike, bike or drive to the preserve, south of Geneva, for a picnic near an authentic Dutch windmill, a stroll through a Japanese garden (open Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays through September), and a tour of the Fabyan Villa Museum, a mid-1800s home redesigned by Frank Lloyd Wright in 1907 (open Wednesdays, Saturdays and Sundays through September). These highlights, along with the wrought-iron gates and vinecovered walkways, make beautiful selfie backdrops.

ONTHE RIVER Experience the Fox on your own or with a savvy guide. **Mill Race Cyclery** in Geneva rents gear (kayaks, canoes and stand-up paddleboards), while a cruise aboard a **St. Charles Paddlewheel Riverboat** will carry you down the river and back again.

INTHEFIELDS Families venture to **Kuipers Family Farm** in Maple Park, **Jonomac Orchard** in Malta and **The Pumpkin Wagon** in Elgin every fall to hunt for the perfect jack-o'-lantern and devour apple cider doughnuts. **Stade's Farm and Market** in McHenry shines for its seasonal U-Pick produce, including classic apples and autumn surprises like green beans, raspberries and beets.



Where to Stay

Overnight in the heart of downtown hospitality along the Fox River.

Within walking distance of restaurants, bars and local entertainment, the almost century-old Hotel Baker in St. Charles or The Herrington Inn and Spa in Geneva combine luxe touches and historic appeal. All of the 50-plus rooms and suites at Hotel Baker come with fluffy robes; some feature private outdoor hot tubs. Step onto your private balcony at The Herrington Inn and Spa before heading to your room to warm up in a whirlpool tub or in front of your own gas fireplace. For guests who want more relaxation, book a spa appointment.



On Friday and Saturday nights, listen to regional musicians while sipping a wine slushie at Fox Valley Winery in Oswego.



ILLINOIS INSIDER The Sandwich Fair (September 4–8) in Sandwich dates to 1888, making / it one of the state's oldest county fairs. It regularly draws more than 160,000 visitors over five days with concerts, deep-fried food and barnyard animals.


Book a palace—ahem, a room—at one of these three luxe lodging options to weave moments, minutes or hours of indulgence into your next getaway.

Fittingly housed in a skyscraper designed by trailblazing modernist architect Mies van der Rohe, The Langham harnesses many of the characteristics the design visionary preferred. His passion for exceptional materials inspires details like Botticino Fiorito marble and dark walnut in guest rooms, and perhaps the addition of caviar and crushed pearl in a facial offered at the Chuan Spa. The window through which diners witness the kitchen staff's culinary acrobatics during a private Chef's Table experience nods to Rohe's love of open expanses. If you opt for a Club room or suite, automatic access to The Langham Club weaves even more splendors into your stay, such as a reading library and evening cocktails. Club members can also gift a custom Chuan massage to a loved one — or themselves.

↓ Decadent Dining

Illinois travelers may picture Chicago first while dreaming about their next gourmet meal, but statewide outposts prove elevated menus exist beyond the Windy City. Le Colonial brings Vietnamese fine dining to Lake Forest. Here, the aromas of earthy-yet-sweet lemongrass and piquant chilies drift from the kitchen, permeating a sea of guests lounging in intricately woven wicker furniture and sipping Cafe Du Monde chicory coffee with sweetened condensed milk to counterpoise the spice. Farther south in Edwardsville. co-owners Gina and Evan Buchholz, who graduated from Le Cordon Bleu Culinary School, serve elevated comfort food at Cleveland-Heath. Spread seasonal jam over crumbly biscuits before digging into locally $sourced \, pork \, chops \, with \, a \, cheddar$ bread pudding accented with jalapeños. Diners sip handcrafted lemonades at Peoria's 2 Chez. Chefs here showcase their creativity with surprising details, splashing brandy into the crème sauce adorning yeal cutlets and blending roasted red pepper into demi-glaces.




Deer Path Inn *Lake Forest*

Anglophiles, rejoice. The traditions of a classic English country estate are alive and well at the Deer Path Inn, with its manicured garden beds and stately Tudor-style foyer. Borrow a complimentary bike and pedal to nearby Lake Forest Beach to watch sailboats buffeted by the wind on Lake Michigan, but leave enough time to return to The English Room at the Inn for a traditional tea service. Sun streams through the venue's floor-to-ceiling windows as you nibble scones and sip smoky lapsang souchong tea. The English Room's offerings extend beyond tea, too-its vino list has received Wine Spectator's coveted Most Outstanding Wine Lists in the World recognition 19 years in a row. Post-pours, retire to your suite $to \, surprise \, your \, partner \, with \, a \, gift \, package \, of \, cotton \, pajamas$ from luxury loungewear company Sleepy Jones. The pocket and sleeve cuff bear the Deer Path Inn's logo, making the set a particularly sumptuous souvenir.

Jail Hill Inn *Galena*

Don't allow the Gothic iron fencing or the four-story brick building's history as a place of confinement intimidate you: For guests staying in one of six 700- to 800-square-foot rooms, the Jail Hill Inn seamlessly blends luxury, comfort and history. Prepare to feel fizzy upon entering your suite, and not just because chilled champagne and chocolates greet $new arrivals. \, Jet-equipped \, tubs \, well-suited \, for \, mass aging$ sore muscles add to your delight, while details such as exposed original beams, brick and fireplaces connect the edifice's past and present. Doze beneath crisp linen sheets and wake to a three-course breakfast starring locally made sausage and flaky croissants. When hunger finds you again after shopping downtown Galena, pick up your inn-provided wine and cheese tray and feast in the courtyard. Celebrating a special occasion? Gift your partner a birthday cake or flowers from the inn, or spoil them with an in-room massage.

↑ Take Pause

Packing a vacation with nonstop activities leaves little time for relaxation. Counteract any travel stress at the **Galena Day Spa**, an open-to-the-public sanctuary despite its location in the **Irish Cottage Inn and Suites**. Nosh on rich chocolates following a couples massage with your darling, and an autumn-appropriate pumpkin latte wrap leaves skin feeling softer than rose petals. Candlelight casts shadows against exposed brick and wood beams in **AIRE Ancient Baths Chicago**. Once a factory, the 1902 building now houses hot mineral baths, salt-laden floating pools, steam rooms and masseuses with a range of specialties. Opt for the wine bath special to soak in actual Spanish Ribera del Duero red grapes. Can't give up a day of exploration? Try **Hand and Stone Massage and Facial Spa** in Geneva. It remains open until 10 p.m. on weekdays, so you can squeeze in a massage or facial after your afternoon adventures end.




HIKING TRAILS

STARVED ROCK STATE PARK, OGLESBY

The thrill of chasing waterfalls draws people to this park's 13 miles of trails, all of which start from the visitors center or parking lots off IL-178 and IL-71. The more rain the Illinois River gets, the more powerful the flow of the cascades. Interior canyon trails lead to eight waterfalls. For an easy to moderate trek (one stone staircase) that's less than a mile, hikers can reach French Canyon with 45-foot walls. Ambitious adventurers can continue to one of the most photographed canyons in the park, LaSalle, a 4-mile round-trip. This moderate to difficult route (nine staircases) can take up to three hours.

SHAWNEE NATIONAL FOREST. HARRISBURG It's a hiker's heaven, encompassing nearly 300,000 acres of oak-hickory forests, wetlands, grassy expanses, lush canyons and sheer bluffs. More than 300 miles of trails are marked, with 30-plus miles for hiking only. A highlight is the Pomona Natural Bridge Trail, a short loop through a forest and over its namesake sandstone bridge. The 90-foot-long span was created by eons

of erosion.


CRAB ORCHARD NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE, MARION

Take a short, easy hike or challenging trek among 44,000 acres of oak-hickory upland forest, bottomland hardwoods, crop fields, brush, prairie, wetlands and lakes. Some trails incorporate displays of local history or the environment. The gentle 1.9-mile Rocky Bluff Trail leads past waterfalls and seasonal wildflowers. The 2.3-mile Grassy Creek Trail is less traveled and moderately difficult.

WATERFALL GLEN, DARIEN

This ecologically impressive forest preserve offers hikers 11 miles of trails over rolling to hilly terrain. And there's a lot to look at: The 2,500 acres of prairies, savannas and oak-maple woodlands nurture 740 native plant species and more than 300 species of mammals, birds, fish, amphibians and reptiles. Also check out **Rocky Glen waterfall** and Sawmill Creek bluff overlook.





MIDEWIN NATIONAL TALLGRASS PRAIRIE, WILMINGTON Hike among the kind of pristine prairie the pioneers experienced-roaming bison included-at this restored site once dominated by rusting munitions factories and abandoned ammunition bunkers. Follow more than 34 miles of trails, 12 miles of which are for hiking only. To see bison, hike south from the Iron Bridge Trailhead to spotting scopes located along the Route 53 Trail and the Group 63 Trail.

Dark Sky Park

A new dark sky trail and other improvements are coming to the Middle Fork River Forest Preserve in Penfield, Illinois' only International Dark Sky Park. Shielded from the glow of urban areas, the preserve is a nighttime refuge for wildlife and a boon for astronomers—the site's North Waterfowl Management Area is open 24 hours a day to accommodate night-sky viewing. The mile-long dark sky trail will be open year-round and accessible to visitors with limited mobility.



ILLINOIS INSIDER: CAPTURING GOLDEN LIGHT Try these tips when photographing sunsets with your y smartphone: Scout out a location beforehand (in person or online). Don't shoot on a perfectly clear evening; clouds and haze provide color and drama. Wait—don't quit when the orange ball disappears. Great shots can come right after. Shoot in RAW format (if your phone allows), then enhance images in a photo editor.

BIKING TRAILS

LAKEFRONT TRAIL, CHICAGO


A full day of Windy City natural wonders and national landmarks awaits on the Lake Michigan shore. The popular path runs 18 miles along the lake, past beaches, parks and downtown restaurants. Spend an afternoon at the Lincoln Park Zoo, Navy Pier (both free) or Shedd Aquarium. Or simply kick back and alternate your gaze between the lake and downtown skyline.

TUNNEL HILL STATE TRAIL

Whirring bicycle freehubs have replaced the clickity-clack of railcars that used to pass through the trail's 543-foot-long namesake. The 45-mile path, mostly crushed limestone with some concrete sections, guides riders from Harrisburg to Karnak, darting through the **Shawnee National** Forest and surpassing the Cache River State Natural Area's swamps filled with cypress and tupelo trees.

Shift Into High Gear Near the Mississippi River bluffs, Grafton Zipline Adventures maximizes the adrenaline, sending thrill seekers through

Zipline Adventures maximizes the adrenaline, sending thrill seekers through the treeline up to 45 mph. Trailblazers reach almost the same speed during a treeskittering journey at **Shawnee Bluffs Canopy Tour** in Makanda. The three-hour adventure stays above ground, with ziplines and aerial bridges connecting the treetops before the grand finale: a 1,100-foot-long trip over a bouldered creek. In Galena, **Long Hollow Canopy Tours** offers excitement from beginning to end. Choose from an aerial adventure park or six-line zipline course, which includes a ride to the first ascent in a utility terrain vehicle and a free fall from the final platform.







I&M CANAL STATE TRAIL

More than 100 miles of trails border the historic canal that connects Lake Michigan to the Illinois River. Visitors wanting to explore the country's first National Heritage Area can rent a bike at seven trailside stations. Once you have your steed, pedal over to Old Joliet Prison, outside of which sunglasses-clad Jake Blues reunited with brother Elwood in The Blues Brothers.

CONSTITUTION

TRAIL This 45-mile trail stretches from Bloomington to Normal, home of Illinois State University. In Bloomington, cycle past the Beer Nuts factory, a family-owned staple since the 1930s, before continuing north through parks, ISU's campus and Uptown Normal's popular shops and restaurants. Like a bicycle wheel, the trail has spokes-its eight branches include the Route 66 portion that traces the Mother Road through Illinois.

GRAND ILLINOIS TRAIL

The name for the 535-mile loop—a collection of other state and local trailscertainly fits. Riders who want to put their legs to the ultimate test over a multiday tour can set off from Lake Michigan and pedal to the Mississippi River bluffs via Illinois' northern prairies. Then they can loop back east, heading toward Chicago along the Illinois River. For just a day trip, pick a stretch of trail that cuts through scenic areas like **Mississippi Palisades** or Apple River Canyon state parks.





ILLINOIS INSIDER: GREEN WHEELS Exploring Illinois via bicycle keeps / more automobiles off the road, which reduces gasoline consumption and limits harmful carbon dioxide emissions that affect everyone's respiratory and heart health.

PALOS TRAIL SYSTEM, COOK COUNTY

The 42 miles of flowing, grin-inducing trails within Palos Preserves cater to riders of all levels, quickly dipping into ravines and grinding up hills alongside lakes and sloughs. The extensive, intersecting system-11 sections of unpaved singletrack that meander around the forest-is the largest in the Chicago area, hosting the annual Palos Meltdown, a mountain bike race and festival (late August).



MOUNTAIN BIKE TRAILS



LAKE GLENDALE REC AREA AND DIXON SPRINGS STATE PARK, SHAWNEE NATIONAL FOREST

Intrepid bikers can spin through the Shawnee National Forest's firstever mountain bike trails, established in 2021. Twist, drop and jump along 19 miles beneath tall pines-from **Dixon Springs State Park** to the loop around Lake Glendale. After a picnic break at Pine Point, descend more than 100 feet on the Rollercoaster Trail to get the blood flowing again.


ILLINOIS INSIDER: READY TO ROLL When you're out on the trail, be courteous // to hikers and other bikers. Keep your speed under control, don't ride in mud and always announce yourself to anyone you're passing.

CATALYST

TOUCH OF NATURE TRAILS, MAKANDA

Beginners can hone their skills on nearly 3 miles of green (easy) trails, while proficient riders take on the difficult Catalyst section, a 3.3-mile snaking stretch along Indian Creek. The youngest set can ride the pump track or the skills loop in the **Kids Terrain Park** before graduating to the adult trails.

KICKAPOO STATE RECREATION AREA, OAKWOOD

Strenuous climbs, tricky turns and bombable descents on more than 10 marked routesthere's no shortage of variety over the 22 miles of trails. The dirt-packed singletrack on Trail 7 runs along a ravine before reaching a jump run at the trail's conclusion, while Trail 4 riders ford some water before the rocky, strenuous climb up Heartbreak Hill.

On the Rocks

While best known for its flush forests, southern Illinois is also a destination for passionate cragsmen and cragswomen. Ferne Clyffe State Park recently added to its rock climbing routes, exceeding more than 100 options to scale the park's cliffs and walls. The newly created climbing area includes eight different walls. Adventurers can also test their grip strength while bouldering in Rebman Hollow. Near Makanda, climbers can try to conquer Devil's Standtable at Giant City State Park. In the Shawnee National Forest, the Jackson Falls area boasts hundreds of climbing and bouldering routes, dozens of which lead out of the forested canyons.



WATER TRAILS



FABULOUS FOX WATER TRAIL

Between the towns of Johnsburg and Ottawa, this beloved paddling path serves up a series of captivating urban and suburban vistas as well as restaurants and breweries for refueling. Hop out and explore dozens of small islands along this National Water Trail or fine-tune your birding skills by spotting Sandhill cranes, cormorants and great blue herons. (The rookery at the Kane-Kendall county line regularly hosts more than 30 nests high above the water.)

LAKE MICHIGAN WATER TRAIL

Though home to just 68 miles of this epic 1,638-mile route that traces the outline of Lake Michigan, Illinois contributes both serenity and sparkle to the National Recreational Water Trail. Launch sea kayaks (ideally with a group or guide) from the secluded beaches of **Illinois Beach State** Park in Zion and get close to coastal bluffs. Carry-in sites along North Shore beaches let you get in a water workout before enjoying neighborhood eateries. Wherever you begin, the Chicago skyline serves as a beacon to keep on paddling.




ROCK RIVER WATER TRAIL

The Bockford-to-Rock Island portion of this National Water Trail courses gently through small towns, rural landscapes and limestone bluffs. You can trace Native American heritage via historic markers and statues along the way that commemorate the Black Hawk and Sauk nations who first lived on these lands. Plan a day trip it inerary with stops at charming Oregon and nearby Grand Detour. a historic village where John Deere invented the first commercially successful steel plow. If you prefer letting the river power your journey, rent a tube at Lundeen's Landing in East Moline.

KANKAKEE RIVER NATIONAL WATER TRAIL The Illinois portion of this blueway shared with Indiana is largely undeveloped and still resembles the Grand Kankakee Marsh, a vast area known before the 1880s as the Everglades of the North, with more than 1,000 square miles of inland water and vegetation. Take your time wending through the Momence Wetlands Nature Preserve and the Momence Wetlands Land and Water Reserve, home to abundant waterfowl, wild turkey and deer.


QUAD CITIES WATER TRAILS The 45 miles of exceptional waterways along the Mississippi



and Rock rivers between Cordova and Andalusia have something for every paddler: urban backgrounds, lush backwater, gentle flows and strong currents. You may even see bald eagles. Expand your explorations by casting a line at fishing hot spots, hiking or biking more than 75 miles of surrounding trails, and recharging at an array of lodging options.

Hues Cruise

Viewed from the bow of a boat as the sun sinks, Illinois' leafy tapestry of red, orange and gold radiates autumn vibes. Hop aboard a **St. Charles Paddlewheel Riverboat** cruise for a 45-minute jaunt. Beginning in October, **Celebration River Cruises** hosts Fall Foliage excursions departing from Moline and featuring meals and live entertainment. Venture upriver to Marseilles Lock and Dam or downriver passing Buffalo Rock on **The Sainte Genevieve**, a stern wheel riverboat launching from Ottawa for scenic rides through Starved Rock Country. The vessel for Grafton Harbor's **Hakuna Matata** cruises may be small, but the views are mighty impressive.

ILLINOIS INSIDER: FALL FISH TALES Seek out an Army Corps lake (there are 11 statewide, six for fishing), which are \checkmark typically well-stocked with hungry fish as winter approaches. Large bass fishing picks up in October, and rainbow trout are plentiful through late October. Charters specializing in both are available throughout the state.



WINTER TRAILS

CROSS-COUNTRY SKI TRAILS Most parks and preserves are open from dawn to dusk, and maintain and groom trails for cross-country skiers; some even offer rental equipment. Lake County Forest Preserves has 209 miles of scenic trails, including a flat loop around the lake at Old School **Forest Preserve** in Mettawa, hilly terrain at Lakewood Forest Preserve in Wauconda (ideal for more advanced skiers), and 31 miles of the Des **Plaines River Trail** for endurance skiers.

SNOWSHOE TRAILS

Step into a pair of snowshoes and move through the snowy season. Most forest preserves and nature centers offer snowshoes on a first-come-firstserved basis. Seek out 13 miles of trails and frozen falls at **Starved Rock State** Park in Oglesby. The **Morton Arboretum** in Lisle lets snowshoers explore its 1,700 acres with four or more inches of snow. And in Monticello's Allerton **Park and Retreat** Center. trek on 16 miles of trails in its natural area.

Eagle Eye

Showing off their 7-footwide wingspans, bald eagles can be spotted soaring over Illinois' rivers and dams between December and March. During this time, Illinois boasts the highest number (outside of Alaska) of the majestic birds, which rely on open water and a bounty of fish. One of the highest concentrations of eagles can be found at Lock and Dam 18 in Gladstone. Other prime viewing spots include the top of the bluffs at Starved Rock and Matthiessen state parks in Oglesby. River towns such as Alton, Rock Island and Quincy host annual eagle festivals.





POSTOAK NATURE TRAIL Sandstone bluffs, formed 100,000 years ago, line this short trail named for a notable tree species in Makanda's Giant City State Park.

FAT-TIRE **BIKING TRAILS** Cycle past bison, elk and cougars at Wildlife Prairie Park in Hanna City. More than 60 different native species of animals call the zoological park home. In winter, the park's 20 miles of mountain bike trails, including 3 miles of wide twotrack for beginners, welcome fat bikes. In the Quad Cities, Friends of Off-Road Cycling built and maintains 40 miles of dirt singletrack. Cyclists who want less of a challenge travel the 1.2 miles of multiuse trails on Sylvan Island in Moline.


SKI AND SNOWBOARD TRAILS

Bunny-hill graduates, beginners and seasoned skiers can all find trails that suit their abilities at **Chestnut Mountain** Resort in Galena. The state's largest ski resort has 19 trails and a 475-foot vertical drop. Snowboarders head to the Farside, a 7-acre terrain park within Chestnut with 25 rails and other features. In Lisle, **Four Lakes Alpine Snowsports** gives suburbanites an opportunity to ski close to home with four trails and a terrain park known as The Alley.







OA RANDY STINE He sang bass in the a cappella


He sang bass in the a cappella group Straight No Chaser, but this Naperville dad of three feels he's retiring on a high note.

When Randy Stine was a senior at Naperville North High School in 1995, he shared his future plans with the student paper: Attend Indiana University with a double major in vocal performance and business. Become wealthy as a bass in a successful singing group. It was a bold but prescient prediction for a musically inclined kid.

Stine first developed his talents in musical theater and, later, show choir. It wasn't until well after he graduated from Indiana University (in telecommunications, with a business minor) that the college a cappella group Stine helped form found a global audience. In 2006, after getting laid off from a corporate job, Stine posted old concert footage of Straight No Chaser singing a holiday mash-up online. The internet loved it, which led to a reunion and five-album record deal.

Stine recently retired from touring with the group as he and his wife, Lindsey, raise their trio of children in Naperville. We asked the singer to reminisce on a dream realized and imagine what's ahead.

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INTERVIEW ONE-ON-ONE





Q Is there a local venue you loved playing?

A The Chicago Theatre holds a special place in my heart from playing there and also seeing acts like James Taylor and Paul Simon. We got to play at the Lyric Opera House, which is a treat because it's such a massive venue. We played in lots of big cities and tucked-away little towns that were on the way to the next stops.

Q Straight No Chaser (SNC) is famous for mash-ups. Can you tell the story behind one?

A I was at a Chicago bar and the music was so loud, I couldn't quite tell what song was playing—I just heard the bass. I thought it was Michael Jackson's "Billie Jean." Then I got closer to the speakers and realized it was "Poison" by Bell Biv Devoe. That night, I pulled up the MP3s of those two songs on my computer and started splicing them together. Lyrically, they can play off each other. It's one of the biggest crowd-pleasers any time we perform it.

Q Your wife, Lindsey, is from Streamwood, Illinois. How did you meet?

A Herbrother was a longtime fan of the group. Unfortunately, he passed away at 20 from cancer. While he was going through his treatments, he would listen to us and work on singing the bass. Before I knew Lindsey, he came to a show, and I signed his cast. Later, she came to a show. I noticed her right away when she went through the signing line. One of the guys sitting next to me said, "She's your type. You could marry her." That was our initial connection.

Q Let's talk about Chicagoland traditions. What are you sharing with your kids?

A Two years in a row I've taken them to the Chicago Air and Water Show. That was a tradition my dad started with me. I remember parking on Michigan Avenue and marching with lawn chairs over our shoulders to North Avenue Beach. It doesn't matter if you're an aviation buff. When these military planes come by, you feel it in your chest.

They have great burgers. My wife and I always go. If you recommend it to someone who has been there, they're like, Oh my gosh, I thought that was my place.

NAPER SETTLEMENT

You can tour historic homes and watch a blacksmith do his work.

Located in a former Naperville Fire Station, the beloved pizzeria has oldtown charm.

Q Which Chicago teams do you cheer on?

← DIE-HARD BULLS FAN Randy Stine (kneeling in front of Michael Jordan) at basketball camp.

A Mybiggest draw was always the Bulls, and I got to go to a bunch of games, plus Michael Jordan's basketball camp. I also grew up a Cubs fan because my dad's company had season tickets. But our neighbor's father, Jerry Hairston Sr., played for the White Sox, so I'd often get to go to his games as well.

Q Naperville has grown quite a bit since you were a kid, right?

A When my parents moved here in 1976, it was a pretty small town. All the field trips I took as a kid were to Chicago, because that was where everything was. They've done a really good job of making Naperville a destination with places to eat and shop, plus it's a great place to raise a family.

Q What was it like singing on the Illinois-themed float in the Rose Parade?

A That was technically my last show with SNC, and it was such a full-circle moment for me. We did a medley from *The Blues Brothers*. I grew up watching that movie and had the soundtrack on CD. It's such a love letter to Chicago and to blues and soul music. John Lee Hooker, James Brown, Aretha Franklin, Cab Calloway, Ray Charles it's incredible they were all in one movie

Q Doyou have a post-SNC project planned?

A Charlie, who left the group a year before me, called me with an idea to do a podcast together. We'd have topics and guests. Since we were both basses in the group, I came up with the idea of calling it *Off-Base*.

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



Rockford's brunch mecca, The Norwegian, emerged from a local kick-starter campaign to salvage a blighted building. Every week the restaurant features brunch and a new dinner menu with produce from local farms. Fans rave about its Benedict and The Sarah, which comes with smashed red potatoes, sunny-side up eggs and bacon, plus a side of toast. And for your Chicago hits list? Savor 100 percent plant-based deliciousness at **Bloom Plant Based Kitchen** and at the new XMarket Food Hall, the largest vegan food hall in the Midwest.




ANIMAL CARE AND CONSERVATION

Brookfield Zoo Chicago became the first U.S. bar-less modern zoological park with its use of moats and natural settings to separate visitors from animals when it opened 90 years ago. Today, animal viewing barely scratches the surface of its offerings and services. The zoo team has helped reintroduce endangered species into the wild, while visitors can register to feed sharks or flamingoes behind the scenes and mingle with penguins via the Wild Connections education program. Nearby, Chicago's Shedd Aquarium, famous for its beluga whales, hosts regular Shedd Aquarium Action Days. The events mobilize volunteers across the city for beach cleanups, habitat restoration and other conservation projects.

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



No headlights are necessary: millions of bulbs line the roadway as carloads of spectators drive through Rock Spring Park.







SCENIC RIVER TOWNS

A Road Trip Above the Rest

This prime segment of the Great River Road features three rivers and a cluster of charming towns.

The Great River Road follows the mighty Mississippi for more than 2,000 miles, including the entire 550-mile western state line. Between Grafton and Hartford, the Mississippi, Illinois and Missouri rivers converge into a 33-mile stretch known as the Meeting of the Great Rivers National Scenic Byway. Due to the close proximity of towns, you can explore it all in a day-or over the

Grafton

Aerie's Resort in Grafton serves as the perfect hub for a weekend of exploring the Great River Road. After checking into your suite, head outside for the **Grafton SkyTour.** Choose either an enclosed gondola or open-air chairlift and watch the vivid fall colors spread out beneath you as you soar above the trees. Back on top of the bluff, you can double down on thrills with more Aerie's attractions: an alpine roller coaster ride (open year-round) and a zipline-and-canopy tour. Alternatively, relax with dinner, drinks and live music on the terrace.

Off-property opportunities include nearby **Pere Marquette State Park,** known for its limestone bluffs and 9 miles of hiking trails. Stop at the visitors center for a map and recommendations on the best trails to explore. If you'd rather take a leisurely drive, follow Scenic Drive, stopping at its multiple overlooks. The 1930s wood-andstone lodge has a massive (700 ton!) fireplace, a supersized chessboard, an indoor pool, a restaurant (try the fried chicken) and winery.


Alton

The 20-mile **Sam Vadalabene Bike Trail** parallels the scenic byway between Alton and Grafton. Snap a selfie next to the Piasa Bird mural painted on a rocky bluff in Piasa Park before hitting the trail. The **National Great Rivers Museum** has interactive exhibits showing the impact of the river on people and nearby land. Peruse the eclectic shops and boutiques along Broadway in downtown Alton, and visit the statue of the **World's Tallest Man.** Stop for lunch at **Tony's Steakhouse,** a family-owned restaurant celebrating its 70th anniversary this year.

Hartford

Climb the 180-foot-tall **Lewis and Clark Confluence Tower** with three overlooks (at 50, 100 and 150 feet) of the Missouri and Mississippi rivers, honoring the place where the Corps of Discovery began its expedition. Learn more at the visitors center, which tells the history of the byway and towns through interactive exhibits and videos.





ALL OUTDOORS

A Weekend in the Country

With an ideal mix of outdoor adventure and indoor luxury, this hunting lodge and resort is built for guests who dream of bagging fall game—as well as those who just want to get away from it all. **Harpole's Heartland Lodge** makes a good base camp for a rural respite with more than 1,200 acres of private trails, prairies and cornfields. Choose from three luxury lodges or six cabins that dot the hilltops and bluffs in Nebo between the Mississippi and Illinois rivers.

Each lodge has a distinctive vibe. The Original boasts a stone fireplace with a hand-carved mantel and Frederic Remington statues. For guests looking for a touch of luxe, check into the Prairie Ridge Lodge, where each of the seven suites comes with a fireplace, two-person hot tub and private deck. The Sunset Valley Lodge lives up to its name with spectacular sunsets seen from the back deck.

Lodge guests who purchase the meal plan (highly recommended) feast on a family-style brunch and dinner. This plan also includes a bonfire and snacks.

Plan Your Stay

Opt for a rejuvenating combination of adventure and relaxation when you stay at Heartland Lodge.

Shoot The hunting package includes a guide to the grounds where white-tailed deer roam and waterfowl migrate. Closer to the lodge, you can shoot your way through a 15-station sporting clays course or on-site pistol range. *Ride* Heartland's ATV park includes gentle trails for beginning riders and mud holes for the more advanced. For a bit of romance, take a guided horse ride, complete with a picnic for two.

Unwind Join a sunset hayride along the old stagecoach route that traces the Mississippi bluffs. Afterward, gather around the bonfire to make s'mores or relax on a deck with a glass of local wine.

WINE WEEKEND Excursion one

Sipping in Shawnee Hills

A dozen family-owned wineries make up the Shawnee Hills Wine Trail in the heart of the Shawnee National Forest. Due to the expansive area and winding roads, tour operators such as Shawnee Shuttle and Wrightway Transportation assist travelers with crafting custom it ineraries to the sunny patios, intimate tasting rooms and outdoor firepits. For ambitious travelers who want to see all the wineries in one weekend, kick off your weekend challenge in Carbondale.

An outdoor wood-burning fireplace warms the patio at Honker Hill Winery. Sip sangria here or wander down by the pond before heading to Rocky Comfort Cabins in Makanda. The hobbit-style hideaway, with a distinctive curved door, comes with a private outdoor hot tub, perfect for a latenight or early-morning soak. Follow the foot path to Blue Sky Vineyard and savor award-winning wines from the patio overlooking the lake or in a tasting room that looks like a Tuscan villa. Saturday starts with a brisk hike at Giant City State Park before a crisp glass of white paired with cheese on the deck of Kite Hill Vineyards. Taste tart apple and sweet strawberry wines in the wooded garden of Pomona Winery before drinking in the awe and sprawl of the Shawnee Hills from the vineyard picnic tables at Hickory Ridge Vineyard. Head to Alto Pass for a German-inspired lunch of sausage and pretzels at Von Jakob Winery and Brewery before listening to live music while sipping from a bottle of Heartland Red on the welcoming lawn of Alto Vineyards. An artisan cheese platter at Peachbarn Winery and Cafe is perfect for sharing before kicking back to live music and a nightcap of Chambourcin red aged in oak at StarView Vineyards in Cobden. It's about a 10-minute drive back to Rocky Comfort Cabins.

Ease into your Sunday morning with a cup of coffee on the patio or in front of the gas fireplace before heading back to Cobden. The menu at **Owl Creek Vineyard** features apps, entrees and the Vineyard Picnic (cheese, sausage, grapes and crackers), which you can take with you to **Wichmann Vineyard.** The winery does not serve food but welcomes guests to bring their own to snack on while sipping wines like Crush, a dry rosé. Listen to live music as you toast a successful weekend with a glass of fruity red on the deck at **Feather Hills Vineyard and Winery.**



WINE WEEKEND Excursion two

Nouveau Wine Weekend

During this annual celebration of Nouveau wine-vintages harvested, bottled and sold in just a few weeks time-Galena rocks with live music and tasting events all weekend long.

This party finds its legs Friday afternoon on Galena's pedestrianfriendly Main Street. Stay downtown and step into history at a boutique hotel. The 1855 **DeSoto House** has 55 Victorianstyled rooms and three restaurants, or check into one of seven stylish suites at **Ulysses Suites**, some with full kitchens.

FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 22

Noon The celebration is officially uncorked with the first toast to the Nouveau wine at the **Galena Cellars** release party and luncheon (Main Street location).

2:30 p.m. Watch as the Nouveau wine is ceremoniously delivered to Main Street merchants by way of a jubilant parade starring horse-drawn carriages and trolleys.

3:00 p.m. Live music courses through downtown all afternoon and evening. Start dancing at the decades-old **Paradise Bar and Grill** and keep the party flowing at **Miss Kitty's Grape Escape**, known for its martinis and late-night food service. **6:30 p.m.** Bon appétit! Galena restaurants like **Bread and Vine Bakery** serve French-inspired menus with entrees such as Moules Frites (mussels and fries) paired with \$5 glasses of Nouveau wine.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 23

11:00 a.m. Brunch is an honored pastime at Otto's Place, where sweet potato hash soaks up Otto's signature Bloody Mary. Or stop for a croissant Danish or weekend-only Pain au Chocolat at Galena Bakehouse.

1:00 p.m. Rejoin the party at the Galena Cellars countryside vineyard, 6 miles from downtown. Sip hot-spiced or caramel apple wine while exploring the property and listening to Keith Scott, a Chicagobased Blues musician.

4:00 p.m. Join The Haunted Galena Tour Company for their weekend Spirits and Spirits Tour, where guides tell stories of hauntings at DeSoto House, Galena Cellars and Galena Brewing Company. Each spooky stop includes a specialty cocktail.

5:30 p.m. Pop into downtown shops like Outside the Lines Art Gallery and Nine Generals, a men's store known for its hand-rolled cigars and handsome accessories. Still hungry? Stop in Galena Cellars Tasting Room for a roasted pumpkin salad and a pancetta, fig and goat cheese flatbread; Kara Gordon serenades the crowd until 8 p.m. WINE TIME If you can't make an official wine weekend, there is always an opportunity to celebrate the fruit of the vine. Assemble your own tour of Galena's numerous wineries and tasting rooms, including Massbach Ridge Winery, Fergedaboudit Vineyard and Winery, and Rocky Waters Vineyard and Winery.



At The Inn at Irish Hollow in Galena, the autumn overnight package includes a sevencourse Autumn Harvest Dinner (recent menus starred spiced pumpkin bisque, heirloom tomato salad and pork tenderloin) and their signature full country gourmet breakfasts. Come winter, borrow the inn's snowshoes to explore the property's rolling 500 acres of forests and pastures, then warm up in front of a blazing fire-there are fireplaces in every room and cottage at the compound. In Chicago, splurge for a memorable meal at West Loop's Smyth or Lincoln Park's Alinea-the city's two restaurants have earned three Michelin stars each, a distinction awarded to just 13 eateries in the United States. An open kitchen and living room-style lounge lend Smyth the comfortable vibe of a friend's house. For an even more personal dinner, reserve the 3.5-hour Chef's Table experience, during which culinary artists serve and explain each course. You can find a similarly intimate meal at The Kitchen Table, Alinea's completely private dining option for groups up to six people. Those lucky enough to secure a reservation can expect equal parts theater and gastronomy: Scented vapors, smoke gels and liquid nitrogen are frequently employed tableside to dazzling, delicious effect.

a 10-minute drive away among or chards and farmland. In New Berlin at Danenberger Family Vinevards, you'll find a similar mix of low-key and lively. Winemaker and owner Susan Sullivan Danenberger produces award-winning Cabernet Franc in a region better known for sweet fruit wines and soybeans on her family's fifth-generation Centennial Farm. Danenberger's WineRocks stage hosts country line dancing lessons and tribute bands several times a week throughout the year. Lynfred Winery has five tastinglocations. Start at its flagship venue in Roselle, which exudes an old-world vibe in the Chicago suburbs with its ivy-laced exterior. Sample a mix of red, white or sparkling wines with a tasting flight of three or six samples. And be sure to take home a bottle of its unique chocolate-covered wine. The bottle is coated in seven lavers of chocolate with a white-and dark-chocolate drizzle that you break off and eat as you drink.



Southern Illinois' mild climate makes a brisk hike along Makanda's Giant City State Park's eight hiking trails a tempting activity even in winter months, especially since you can warm up after in the park's Giant City Lodge. Its showstopper, two-story-tall fireplace is framed by white oak timber and was made from locally quarried sandstone in the 1930s by the Civilian Conservation Corps. Indulge in a hearty meal at the on-site restaurant, famous for its all-you-caneat fried chicken dinners. January and February are prime months to spot bald eagles around the Pere Marquette Lodge and Conference Center in Grafton. Observe these majestic native birds along the Illinois River, then head inside for a portrait in front of the 700-ton limestone fireplace, which dominates the lodge's great room and restaurant. Go ice-skating, sledding $or snow shoeing at {\bf Eagle Ridge Resort and}$ Spa, then roast s'mores over firepits in Galena. Warm up with a bottle of Eagle Ridge Signature Wine in a heated igloo. Inside the resort, find more welcoming nooks near the lobby and lounge fireplaces. After exploring the Windy City's Gold Coast, Ambassador Chicago offers respite. The $nearly\,century\mbox{-}old\,boutique\,hotel\,exudes\,charm$ and opulence. Unwind with a cocktail in front of the fireplace in The Library before heading to your room or suite, some with city views.

Even along Alton's "Millionaire's Row" of historic homes, the Beall Mansion stands out: Stately white columns frame the double wood-and-glass front doors, and 12-feet-tall ceilings, crystal chandeliers and marble statues greet you inside. The mansion was built in 1902 and was once home to state Sen. Edmond Beall. Today, the three-story inn's decadent amenities match its upscale decor and pedigree. There's a 24-hour complimentary chocolate buffet-a mix of small-batch fine chocolates and classic favorites like Hershey's Kisses-and in the rooms, you'll find four-poster feather beds, fireplaces and whirlpool tubs. Get some extra Z's and ask for a gourmet break fast of fresh coffee and fruit, Tortuga rum French toast, and a salmon-and-spinach omelet delivered to your room. Over in Chicago, steps away from Millennium Park and Navy Pier, you can order in breakfast from Arlo Chicago's on-site gastropub, About Last Knife. From 7 to 11 a.m., smoked salmon bagel spreads, chilaquiles, and chicken and waffles can magically appear bedside.



In the West Loop neighborhood, Level Fulton Market has studios, one-, two-, and three-bedroom furnished apartments available for nightly and monthly stays. Each of the 56 options has fully equipped kitchens and laundries, plus rainfall showers and deep soaking tubs, so you get the comforts of home with hotel perks.


The best way to wind down after a hustle-bustle day exploring the Windy City? Enjoying a bite or drink from a peaceful bird's-eye vantage point, high above the fracas of the streets below. On Thursday and Friday evenings, Skydeck Chicago inside the Willis Tower stays open late for 10 p.m. Pie in the Sky dinners, 1,353 feet (or 103 floors) up in the air. Just seven tables are available to create a VIP vibe, and the three-course meal is catered by beloved deepdish stalwart Giordano's Pizza. On a clear night, the Skydeck affords views of up to 50 miles and four states. The rooftop bar on LondonHouse Chicago's 21st floor overlooks the Chicago River. Watch water taxis and yachts cruise by and order from a full menu, including small plates (coconut shrimp and Parmesan truffle fries), lunch and dinner (steaks, salads and short ribs), weekend brunch (waffles and king crab Benedict),

and cocktails (the Snowbird has rum, allspice liqueur and passion fruit). At CloudBar at **360 Chicago**, mirrored ceilings and floor-to-ceiling windows amplify panoramic views of Lake Michigan and the city skyline from the 94th-floor observation deck. Bring the kids for an afternoon soft-serve treat, or make it a date night and sample CloudBar's cocktails.

GO ON A MOON HIKE

Explore the grounds of **Allerton Park** in Monticello under the glow of a full moon. Nighttime guided hikes give guests a strong chance to hear an owl or the howl of coyotes. Not so nocturnal? Opt for Allerton Folk School's daytime workshops or reserve a room in the historic mansion.

CHASE WATERFALLS

Find impressive icefalls at **Starved Rock State Park** in Oglesby, where numerous canyons draw adventure seekers with the training and certification to scale them. (An exhilarating new short documentary, *Ice Climbers of Starved Rock*, showcases the sport.) Hiking in to take a look? Be sure to wear proper winter gear, including durable traction cleats, before hitting the trails.

WATCH SNOW SCULPTING

Artists who participate in the annual **Illinois Snow Sculpting Competition** embrace a medium that melts (January 22–25). Watch them at work in Rockford's Sinnissippi Park as high school and adult teams from across the state come together to carve whimsical designs from 6-foot blocks of the white stuff.





SKI AND SNOWBOARD

Powder chasers love Chestnut Mountain Resort's 19 runs and ample aprés-ski options in Galena. Suburban skiers can take to the towropes at **Four** Lakes Alpine Snowsports in Lisle. Snowboarders are also welcome at both, but might set their sights on Snowstar's extensive terrain park near Andalusia. Watch elite skiers as they launch off a 70-meter jump during the Norge Winter Ski Jump Tournament in Fox River Grove (late January).

RIDE THE POLAR EXPRESS

Passengers of all ages don their coziest pajamas to sip hot chocolate and sing along with carolers during an hour-long train ride to the "North Pole" via the **Monticello Railway Museum Wabash Depot.** As in the classic children's book, those who can still hear Santa's bells receive a railway surprise.

GO TUBING

Weekends when there's plenty of snow, head to **Mount Hoy** near Warrenville. Here, a \$10 Forest Preserve District-issued rental tube is your ticket to a full day of sliding down the 800-foot hillside. Or get groovy at **Snow Park at Alpine Hills** in Rockford, which offers Friday nightglow tubing opportunities. They make their own snow when the conditions are right.

SNOWMOBILE

See historic stone aqueducts, canal locks and panoramic views of the Illinois River via snowmobile. The extensive **Illinois and Michigan Canal National Heritage Area** features various access points to 61 miles of groomed trails running from Rockdale to LaSalle. Life-size steel silhouettes placed throughout tell stories of historical figures.

SLED

Traipse the frozen fairway of The Galena Territory's **Eagle Ridge Resort and Spa,** where sledding down the signature 10th hole of The General golf course provides a bird'seye view of the grounds. Or follow in the footsteps of generations by treading up 125 limestone steps to then sled from the top of the 100-foot-tall **Swallow Cliff Woods** bluff in Palos Park, south of Chicago.

DISC GOLF

Practice your power shot amid the powder at **Dellwood Disc Golf** in Lockport. When it's snowy, staff shovel out the tee pads along the 27-hole course and canyon. The shop stocks cold-weather equipment like glow-in-the-dark tape for playing after winter's early sunsets. Flex-start tournaments are great for a group.

CROSS-COUNTRY SKI

Sagawau Environmental Learning Center in Lemont nods to Nordic heritage. Here, cross-country skiers can enjoy the lowimpact, cold-weather sport in a serene setting. Beginners can find rentals, lessons, and groomed and tracked trails 35 miles southwest of Chicago. The mile loop at Lakewood Forest Preserve's winter sports area offers experienced skiers a series of hills.

DID YOU KNOW?

KISS A REINDEER

In central Illinois, get up close and personal with Santa's hooved helpers at **Hardy's Reindeer Ranch** in Rantoul (through December). The ticketed Reindeer Experience Tour includes admission to the animals' enclosure and a chance to feed one a treat. Afterward, check out the selection of fresh-cut trees, wreaths and garlands.

WATCH EAGLES

Bring binoculars to the river towns of Alton, Quincy or the Quad Cities to observe wintering American bald eagles. During the winter, Illinois sees more of the species than any other state outside Alaska. These riveting raptors often nest along the banks of the **Mississippi River** and dive for fish between ice floes.

TRAVERSE THE TRAILS

Extend the hiking season by snapping into crosscountry skis or stepping into snowshoe frames (rentals begin in January) at **The Morton Arboretum** in Lisle. Snowshoe at the **Red Oak Nature Center** in North Aurora. Both offer access to groomed trails. As you move through tranquil winter landscapes, try to ID leafless trees based on their bark and branches.



FAT BIKE

Navigating a fat-tire bike around the groomed loop at **Wildlife Prairie Park** outside Peoria is an adventure in itself. The trail includes challenging uphills as it runs along Kickapoo Creek. Admission includes access to the animal viewing areas, home to bison, elk, cougars, wolves and other creatures once abundant here.

SEE SHOOTING STARS Gaze across the Milky Way at Middle Fork River Forest Preserve northeast of Champaign, where the North Waterfowl Management Area is open 24 hours to accommodate night-sky viewing. Recognized as an International Dark Sky Park, this serene setting is protected from light pollution, delighting astronomers and animals alike.

MEET A LION IN THE SNOW

Brutus and Titus, **Brookfield Zoo Chicago's** African lions, always enjoy celebrity status at the park. But even the big cats might admit the "mane" event in November and December is the annual Holiday Magic lights festival, which involves large-scale illuminated animal displays, millions of LED lights and visits with Santa (through December 23).

TAP INTO MAPLE SYRUP

When sap from the sugar maples at **Edward L. Ryerson Conservation Area** starts to flow (early March), trek to the forest preserve in Riverwoods. This sweet spot for syrup production hosts hour-long hikes that end in a taste. Or buy a bottle from **Funks Grove Pure Maple Sirup** in Funks Grove (15 miles southwest of Bloomington). The Sirup Shop usually has bottles available for purchase on March 1.

GO BIRDING

Watch the sky, trees and brush at **Volo Bog State Natural Area** in Ingleside, southeast of Fox Lake, to catch many bird species in flight and resting along both the boardwalk and trail. In winter, the feeders by the visitors center are also popular. Warm up inside and enjoy other nature programs held here.

DROP A LINE

Ice-fishers can bring home bluegill, crappie, largemouth bass, channel catfish, walleye and muskellunge at Sterling Lake at **Van Patten Woods** in Wadsworth, west of Illinois Beach State Park. Just wait until the lake freezes to the depth of at least 4 inches. Competitive anglers might also enjoy **Blackwell Forest Preserve**, which hosts an ice-fishing tournament each winter in Warrenville.

FEEL THE GLOW

Community light displays across the state each put different twists on their twinkle. **East Peoria Festival of Lights** features a lighted nighttime parade and drive-through display with horse-drawn wagon rides. In the St. Louis area, **The Way of Lights**, which benefits the National Shrine of Our Lady of the Snows in Belleville, depicts the biblical Christmas journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem with more than 1.5 million lights.

SIP CREATIVE COCKTAILS

The 21-plus crowd can enjoy a boozy hot chocolate in the ambience of Navy Pier's Snowglobe at **Offshore Rooftop**, which claims the Guinness World Record-certified world's largest rooftop. Order more snow-phisticated options, too, like their Polar Expresso martini topped with white chocolate cotton candy that dissolves in the drink.

CURL

Given the number of hot spots setting up curling sheets during the winter months, this chill sport might be establishing itself as a game of bags' cooler cousin. Find ice and synthetic versions at spots such as **The Gwen** and **Lakefront Lodge at Harry Caray's Tavern, Navy Pier.**

SAVOR S'MORES AND MORE

Chill with a cocktail and nibble small bites or sushi, but save room for dessert at the **I|O Godfrey Roofscape** bar and lounge. The s' mores kit for two, served tableside, is a romantic option. Or gather a group of four or more friends to roast marshmallows around a cabana firepit.

When Santa's sleigh stops in the Windy City, **London House Chicago's** 22nd-story terrace is a tantalizing place to touch down. Mid-November through the end of January, the top-floor restaurant and bar at this swanky Michigan Avenue hotel shimmers like the prettiest package under the tree. Even the red-nosed reindeer is bucking for a reservation.


BELLY UP TO A HOLIDAY POP-UP BAR

WINDOW SHOP

Generations of Chicagoans consider peering into department store window displays a peak holiday pastime. **Macy's State Street Holiday Windows** wow crowds with a different theme each year. Work up a wish list there, or scope out more than 450 stores along **The Magnificent Mile**, Michigan Avenue's stretch from The Bean to Oak Street.



Scan the code for more places to go and things to do. Rosemont

Seemingly all roads (and runways) lead to Rosemont, long a hub for busy travelers en route, but now with more reasons than ever for a leisurely visit.



POPULATION 3,672

OF NOTE The village's water tower, intricately painted to resemble a rose, has been a beloved landmark since 1982.

Though best known as a waystation of hospitality for travelers flyingis a worthy destination in its own right.And you can ride the L train there fromdowntown Chicago (30–45 minutes onthe Blue Line).

The Blue Line Station in Rosemont is conveniently close to Parkway Bank Park, the village's entertainment complex built around a green gathering space. The enclave offers upscale dining, comedy, cinema, bowling and more, and the lawn hosts concerts, festivals and a winter ice rink. Not far away, the Pearl District beckons with more restaurant options, plus boutique lodging and arcade games.

Speaking of games, Rosemont's state-of-the-art Impact Field is home to the Chicago Dogs, an independent professional baseball team. The stadium seats 6,300 for games and more than 10,000 for concerts. Allstate Arena, with a capacity of 18,500, is one of the Chicago area's largest indoor facilities. It provides home ice for the Chicago Wolves of the American Hockey League, as well as a venue for wrestling, monster trucks and concerts by big-time artists. (Taylor Swift has performed there.) S P A R K L E L I G H T F E S T I V A L Lights dazzle alongside activities for the whole family.

DO

Test your belly laugh at the Rosemont location of legendary **Zanies Comedy Club**, founded in Chicago 46 years ago. Walk through a million lights, visit with Santa, ice-skate, glide down a two-story ice slide and ride the Holly Trolly during **Sparkle Light Festival** at Impact Field (mid-November through December).

EAT

Carmine's in the Pearl District promises classic Italian dishes. Expect tang and twang at **Bub City** in Parkway Bank Park, where barbecue, whiskey and live country music form a potent trio.

STAY

A room at Aloft Chicago O'Hare in Parkway Bank Park puts you within walking distance of major attractions. Loews **Chicago O'Hare Hotel** boasts a downtown vibe but is only five minutes from the airport and has an on-site gastropub, The Ashburn. Both hotels are across from luxe shopping at Fashion **Outlets of Chicago.**

DO

Route 66 is famous for its quirky attractions, and you'll find several in Logan County. Take a selfie with the **World's Largest Covered Wagon** in Lincoln. (Abe's in the driver's seat.)

EAT AND DRINK

Trya Route 66 Amber or one of the other core beers at Spirited **Republic/Limerick Brewing Company** in Lincoln. It's run by three local home brewers who decided to share their creations with the rest of the town. They've been making doughnuts for 60 years at Mel-O-Cream Lincoln, and thoughnewowners assumed the longtime family business a few years ago, the sweet tradition continues. Goearlyfor the best selection.

<u>Stay</u>

Catch a historical vibe at Lincoln's Loft, a rental row house apartment in Lincoln. Exposed brick, a spiral staircase and original18-foot-tall tin ceilings evoke an earlier era. There's a hidden entrance behind a bookcase too. Laze on the front porch amid relaxing rural views at the Historic Gillett Farm in Elkhart. Once the caretaker's home, it's now a modern rental with three bedrooms, two baths, a full kitchen and a laundry.



Land OF LINCOLN Logan County

Past and pastoral merge in Logan County, the state's geographic center, where the histories of Abraham Lincoln and Route 66 overlap against a bucolic backdrop.

If Illinois were a dartboard, the bulls-eve would be somewhere in Logan County. It's not only smack-dab in the middle of the state, but also a high-value target for history buffs. Lincoln, the county seat, is the only U.S. town named for Abraham Lincoln before he became president-Abe himself christened the place in 1853 by slicing open a watermelon. The town was born from the need for a railroad stop about halfway between Springfield and Bloomington, then later became a stop on Route 66, the storied Mother Road stretching from Chicago to California. Route 66 also passed through nearby Atlanta, a town where Lincoln the young lawyer spent time as he traveled around the 8th Judicial Circuit.

Visit Lincoln's stately Logan County Courthouse, built in 1905 and still in use. Inside, see the stained-glass dome, a mosaic of the Illinois State Seal, and historical murals and portraits. Statues and markers dot the surrounding lawn.

In addition to its rich history, Logan County is worth exploring for its natural beauty. Small farming towns and villages have grown up on some of the world's richest soil, while other parts of the land remain undeveloped prairie, covered in lush grasses, trees and flowers—not much different from how Native Americans and early settlers found it. Soak in the scenery on a leisurely drive through the countryside, or get closer to the land by riding bike trails, playing golf or picnicking in a nearby park. **POPULATION** 27,590

Macomb, the McDonough County seat where Forgottonia was born, is home to Western Illinois University and a retail-diverse downtown with a historic courthouse square. In 1858, Abraham Lincoln had his portrait taken at a studio on the square, one of two significant stops he made in Macomb during the time of his famous debates with Stephen Douglas. While there, Lincoln discussed debate strategy with his advisers, talks that changed the course of his political career-and the nation. You never know what might happen on a visit to Macomb.



DO

Play the world's largest Monopoly board on Macomb's courthouse square. Macombopoly pays homage to the classic game and its inspiration, The Landlord's Game, which was invented by Macomb resident Elizabeth "Lizzie" Magie-Phillips.

EAT

Start your day with a grilled cinnamon roll at The Old Dairy, where breakfast is served all day. Illinois-grown hops flavor some of the craft beer at Forgottonia Brewing in Macomb. Where's the beef? It's at Chubby's Smoke and Steakhouse in Macomb. Favorites include the brisket sandwich. the Brisket Mac N Cheese Stacker and a breaded pork tenderloin sandwich.

STAY

University Union Hotel, on the second floor of the Western Illinois University Student Union, offers 27 guest rooms and two spacious suites. The Best Western Macomb Inn, in a convenient location on the east side of town. has free breakfast and a heated indoor pool.

M c D O N O U G H COUNTY COURTHOUSE Look for giant sculpted Macombopoly game and pieces on the square.

DO

Pickyourown pumpkins and flowers on a visit to Rendleman Orchards in Alto Pass. Down the road, drink up wine and views from the rooftop Vine Deck of Alto Vineyards. For a steeper ascent, scale the massive sandstone blocks at Holy Boulders. a climbing area near Pomona. Call it old-school pottery: Alto Clay Works is in the former Alto Pass grade school. Shop for



pieces and take a class.

Pork out with your fork out at 17th Street BBQ in Murphysboro, founded by the late Mike Mills, a legendary pitmaster. Try the pork and the brisket, both seasoned with their signature Magic Dust. House-made flatbreads highlight the changing menu at The Peachbarn Cafe in Alto Pass, which focuses on seasonal, locally sourced fare.

STAY

Go rustic without roughingitat Persimmon Lodge in Carlyle. The two cabins are close to nature but far from primitiveyou get central heat and air, a stone fireplace, and a full kitchen. It's always a classy stay at the **Davie School** Inn in Anna, a 1910 schoolhouse-turnedboutique inn. Each subject-themed suite features a king-size bed.whirlpooltub. kitchenette and original chalkboard.



Route 127

Experience a cornucopia of flavors and a corridor of colors on a scenic journey through the state's southernmost parts. Small towns here are big on ways to enjoy the outdoors.

That old expression "taking the scenic route" is never more accurate than when you're driving Illinois Route 127 between Carlyle and Jonesboro in southern Illinois. The 90-mile northsouth trip bridges the Big Muddy River and slices through a rolling region of natural wonders, such as Shawnee National Forest, Trail of Tears State Forest and Giant City State Park. Plus, acres of fertile land have been cultivated as orchards and vineyards that sustain U-pick farms and wineries.

Even some cold-hardy palm trees will grow in the relatively mild climate, which sometimes feels more southern than northern. History has put down deep roots in the soil too. The third Lincoln-Douglas debate of 1858 took place in Jonesboro—see historical markers in Lincoln Memorial Park, which is a lovely place for a walk.

In fall, beauty and bounty merge to produce a harvest of hues and flavors. Get a commanding view of blazing trees at Little Grand Canyon in Shawnee National Forest. A 3-mile loop trail leads to scenic overlooks more than 300 feet above the canyon floor.

Celebrate the abundance of apples in pie, cider, butter and more at the annual Murphysboro Apple Festival in September. A big parade—one of Illinois' longest—caps off the five-day event. Grains grow in bumper crops, too, providing fodder for craft breweries. LITTLE GRAND CANYON TRAIL Discover scenic overlooks, colorful cliffs and seasonal waterfalls.

DAVIE SCHOOLINN Choose from eight themed suites and three romantic luxury suites at this former school-turned-inn.

TRAVELER INFORMATION

DRIVING IN ILLINOIS

Illinois highways and roads are well maintained and provide posted signage for drivers, so taking a road trip is a breeze. Chicago is a day's drive or less from major cities including Cincinnati, Cleveland, Detroit, Indianapolis, Kansas City, Milwaukee, Minneapolis, Pittsburgh, St. Louis and Toronto.

State law requires you to wear a seatbelt when traveling by car. Speed limits are posted in miles per hour (mph) and vary between 70 mph on rural interstates and freeways and 45 mph on urban interstates and freeways.

You may not use your cell phone for texting while driving, and you must use hands-free technology to make calls.

For construction updates, maps, seasonal road conditions and other information, visit *gettingaroundillinois.com*

ILLINOIS TOLLWAYS Some northern Illinois highways require tolls for use. Rates vary; not all toll plazas have attendants. Electronic toll collection is available through I-PASS or any transponder that's part of the E-ZPass system.

Drivers who miss tolls have 14 days to pay online. Note the date, time and locations of unpaid tolls that information will be required when submitting payments online.

REST AREAS AND WELCOME CENTERS

The state of Illinois serves drivers with 30 rest areas and 11 welcome centers, located on highways throughout the state. Open 24 hours a day, they offer restroom facilities, picnic areas, lighted walkways, maps, security cameras and parking for recreational vehicles, among other services. For locations, visit *idot.illinois.gov*

ARRIVING BY PLANE

Domestic travelers can fly direct to destinations including Belleville, Bloomington-Normal, Champaign-Urbana, Marion, Moline, Peoria, Quincy, Rockford and Springfield, as well as Chicago.

Once you land at either of Chicago's two major airports, Chicago Transit Authority trains can get you downtown. For info, go to **transitchicago.com**

Regular shuttles to many Chicago downtown hotels leave from each airport. You can also get a taxi or rideshare. For more information on getting to and from Chicago's airports (including renting vehicles or arranging car services), visit *flychicago.com*

From O'Hare International Airport, the Blue Line elevated train (known as the L) takes passengers to downtown Chicago in about 45 minutes. Follow the CTA Trains or Trains to City signs at the airport. If you arrive at the international terminal, follow the signs to the Airport Transit System, where you can get a free ride to Terminal 2 and then catch the L into the city.






